FORWARD

The following general information on the 1986 entering class has been prepared to supplement admission materials assembled prior to the matriculation of the class. More complete information concerning the Law School as a whole may be obtained from the University of Virginia School of Law publication "Institutional Information Application, 1986-87."

PROFILE OF THE 1986 ENTERING CLASS

The 381 students who entered the first year of law study at the University of Virginia in August 1986 were selected from a total of 3535 applicants from over 500 different colleges and universities. There were 214 Virginia residents, and the remaining 167 came from 30 different states, the District of Columbia, and England. There were 141 women students and 47 black students.

Although widely different approaches to college grading often serve to render comparative statements about undergraduate records misleading, it is significant that most of the students in this fall's entering class ranked in the upper 20 percent of their graduating classes. The median grade-point average for the entering class was 3.51 on a 4.0 scale. The median LSAT performance was 39 (eighty-seventh percentile). Many of these students also have completed advanced degree work. The average age was 24.

The Law School has continued its policy of giving preferred status to Virginia applicants, but a large number of highly qualified non-Virginians must be turned away for lack of space. A total of 753 Virginia residents applied for admission, compared with 2782 out-of-state applicants.
