
GEOGRAPHIC REPRESENTATION

International students come from Brazil, Canada, China, Costa Rica, Dominica, Ecuador, France, Iran, Sierra Leone and South Korea.



THE CLASS OF 2012 was selected from the largest applicant pool in the Law School's history. Not surprisingly, the undergraduate grade-point average of entering students also reached new heights this year. Equally important, the Class of 2012 is the most diverse class on record: women comprise 47 percent of the class, and 27 percent of the class identify themselves as minority students.

LIFE BEFORE LAW SCHOOL

Testing the Legal Waters

Members of the Class of 2012 have worked at law firms as paralegals and interns, but many obtained perspective on lawyering and public policy from positions with institutions such as the European Parliament, the World Bank, The Hague, the U.S. Supreme Court, Congress and the White House.

Federal Public Service

Members of the Class of 2012 worked for the U.S. departments of State, Treasury, Homeland Security, Commerce, Labor, Health and Human Services, Justice, Energy, Defense and Education. Others have served in the Army, Navy and Air Force, some with recent duty in the Middle East. One entering student was a staff ops specialist with the FBI.

Local Public Service

Some entering students worked in governor's offices in Alabama, Virginia, Utah, Florida and Minnesota; public defender's and prosecutor's offices in New York, California, Texas, Washington, D.C., Pennsylvania, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida and Virginia; and the chambers of federal and state judges across the country. Several incoming first-year students have taught at the

elementary, secondary or college level, including as an associate professor of philosophy.

Private Industry

Many members have been analysts, consultants or researchers with private-sector firms, think tanks, institutes, and foundations. There are industrial, electrical, chemical, computer and mechanical engineers. Several have been editors, interns, writers, production assistants and columnists for local, national and international newspapers. Others worked as a hip-hop radio show host, an EMT, a registered nurse, a flight paramedic, a veterinary technician, a freelance musician, a surgical aide, a bus operator, a professional stage and film actor, a light-rail train operator, a merchandise planning coordinator, a private investigator, a real estate agent, a nursing home manager, a Chinese interpreter and a pastor.

Academic Backgrounds

Class members have undergraduate and graduate degrees in journalism, international relations, history, health sciences, foreign languages, education, business administration, accounting, American civilizations, anthropology, art history, art design, biology, biomedical engineering, chemistry, classics, finance, religion, psychology, linguistics, political science, chemical engineering, civil engineering, policy studies, sociology, music, communications, economics, public affairs, electrical engineering, physics, zoology, criminal justice, marine sciences, industrial engineering, English, drama, mathematics, philosophy, film production, mechanical engineering and computer science.

Volunteers

Entering students have participated in a variety of volunteer and extracurricular pursuits. These include service and advocacy on behalf of children, the environment, the mentally and physically disabled, the homeless, the orphaned, the hospitalized, the wrongfully imprisoned, senior citizens, victims of domestic or sexual abuse, people battling addiction and migrant farm workers. Others served as youth-sports coaches, saved lives as volunteer firefighters, tutored and mentored students, taught English and other languages in the United States and abroad, served as missionaries, and fundraised and campaigned for political candidates at the local, state and national level.
